Check back as trips may be added throughout the season.

Attending a trip? Please contact the leader to let them know to expect you. In case of inclement weather, contact the leader to find out about postponement or rain date. Everyone is welcome, whether you're new to butterflying or an old hand! These gatherings are fun social occasions and often involve post-trip gatherings over lunch or a nearby ice cream shop.

Tips for an enjoyable experience: Suggested materials include binoculars, sunscreen, water, hat, insect repellent, any allergy medicines, and a camera. Wear comfortable clothing and sturdy walking shoes. You may also want field guides, a hand lens, pen/pencil & pad for recording, and snacks and/or lunch.

Club Guidelines for Field Trips and Events:

- Butterflies will be enjoyed without netting them.
- Take care when exploring not to trample butterfly habitat, particularly host and nectar plants critical to caterpillar and butterfly feeding.
- Be courteous to fellow participants. Allow everyone to see the butterfly before moving in to take pictures.
- Respect property guidelines, e.g. one-way trails, parking limitations, etc.
- No dogs, service animals excepted.

Leaders:

- Trips are held at the discretion of the leader. If for any reason a leader isn't comfortable and an alternate leader isn't found, the trip can be cancelled.
- Leaders are responsible for knowing and following the property guidelines of the field site. These may include one-way trails, parking limitations, etc.

Participants:

- Contact the trip leader at least one day before to let them know you will be participating.
- Participants are welcome to mask if they prefer.

Watch Facebook/MassLep for pop-up walks during the butterfly season. Participants are welcome to bring lunch/snacks for socializing after the walk.

Saturday April 25, 2026 10am

Mt. Tom, Holyoke - **CANCELED**

Mt. Tom State Reservation is in the heart of the Connecticut River Valley. We will search for Mourning Cloaks, Eastern Comma and Compton Tortoiseshell. We will look for Broad-winged Hawks as well. Meet at the Bray Lake parking lot. Use the Route 5 entrance NORTH of Holyoke, opposite the old SKI OUTLET STORE. No rain date.

(Gas pipeline: intersection of Bare Hill Rd with 3 Cornered Pond Rd)

Walk down the paths in search of duskywings, elfins, mourning cloaks, and other **early spring species**. This walk is designed to be slow-paced and friendly to all levels of butterfly watching. She notes that their numbers are far fewer now, but when/if they appear this season, Renee will happily lead a group to see them. Explore this former farm and town-owned property with fields ablaze with ragged robin, yellow rattle, and grasses. Common Ringlets, American Coppers, Spring Azures, Red Admirals, Little Wood Satyrs, Pine Elfin, Mourning Cloaks, Swallowtails, and Skippers have all been sighted in the past. Bird lovers may catch a glimpse of nesting bobolinks. Park by the barn down Shaw Lane off of Putnam Hill Road (not the Central Turnpike parking entrance). Tick repellent suggested, although trails are usually mowed low. Bring water. Trail map is online for any wishing to later explore the woods. We will walk about a mile along mowed paths through fields of Milkweed, Bergamot, Dogbane, Joe-pye weed, Golden Rod and New England Asters. We might find Monarchs, assorted Skippers, Wood Nymphs, Pearl Crescents, Swallowtails and Sulphurs. Meet at parking lot off of Mason Street. (From the intersection of Rts. 2 and 7 in Williamstown, take Rt. 7 north for 1.7 mi. Bear right onto Mason St. (steep dirt road uphill) and follow to entrance and parking (10 cars)). Some places may be wet so waterproof shoes a good idea. Bring water and lunch.

Francis Crane Reserve in Falmouth – **NEW location**

Survey butterfly diversity at the Crane Reserve. Look for Monarchs, Spicebush and Tiger Swallowtails, Baltimore Checkerspot and Gossamer Wings along with Skippers. Possibly Hummingbird Moths. Off Cape— Rt. 495 to Bourne Bridge then turn South on Rt 28. Eventually take Rt 151 East to Francis Crane Reserve in North Falmouth. Go straight on dirt road about 1/4 mile and park next to Model Airplane Airfield. Bring lunch and water. Trails are easy walking. If wet-bring water proof shoes or boots. Explore this 93.1 acre Conservation area which borders the Sudbury River and is home to many grassland birds. Our butterfly species list will assist the Wayland Conservation Commission in their ongoing restoration efforts at the site. Begin at the **conservation area parking lot off of Moore Road, Wayland**. We will **carpool to Glezen Lane** where we will search for butterflies in the first large field, which includes an area that has been under active restoration with native plants.
